

This, the Winter issue, includes as usual the <u>final results of the past season</u> and also the review by Phil Hossell, as usual immaculately presented. Many thanks to members who sent me the 5 open meeting reports.

Membership renewal time has come round again! As last year there are unnumbered pages for you to remove and send to the Treasurer, and the Committee have asked me to include again a comments sheet on the back. So more comments please! Also you will find Paul Hinde's request for volunteers to help at the NEC show. Those pages are in the centrefold, between pages 16 and 17.

On the cover you see Ian Coppenhall. Only on special occasions do I put people on the cover but I think all would agree that Ian deserves it this time! The occasion was the presentation at Pingewood of the Orbital and all the Aphelion trophies, plus the Pingewood open trophy too.

There are <u>quite a lot of photos</u> this time, in addition to the competition photos, individually acknowledged, Anne Browning provided those of Ian, Ros and Sue Coppenhall, Liz Appleby the one on page 15 and Liz Hossell the other five.

There was a bit of a mix-up about the cover photo last time - I sent two with two alternatives for the contents page and the Editor's notes. One was one of mine, a head & shoulders photo of Henry and Norah, which was used and the other, my backup, taken by Anne, of them cutting the cake. As you see they used the wrong sheets inside. The point was I preferred my picture, but I took it using a digital camera and the picture resolution was not of the best, rather than megabytes the storage for it was only 20 kB. I was not at all sure that the printers could use it, but they excelled themselves and produced a cover picture better than I can on my printer. Well done and thanks to them. Why am I saying all this? Just to mention that I can now encourage digital photos, taken on the most humble digital cameras and sent to me via email, and the printers can make a good job of it. It's the topicality of pictures that matters, not the quality.

First of all, let me remind you how my 2000 Review started at this time last year. "There is one person that will be mentioned over and over again in this article." I did not think that I could say the same again this year, but it is true. A different name it may be, but still the same amount of commitment to his sailing and a great deal of support from his family. If you don't yet know to whom I am referring to, then where have you been this last 8 months?

Just before I confirm the identity of this individual, I must offer the man of last year all the very best after his recent marriage to our Association Secretary. Well done Henry & Norah, it did not seem to affect the appetite for sailing. Let's hope we still see your presence just as much on the circuit next year.

Right, back to the man of 2001. He is still only 18 and his achievements this year will be very difficult to surpass. He won every Open Meeting that he entered, yes all 19. That didn't leave many for the rest of us to try and win. He won many races by a considerable margin and was only pushed hard in some and even occasionally beaten, but still managed to come out on top by the end of each event. He also won every area and of course the Orbital. Well done Ian Coppenhall. I don't' believe that anyone will ever match your record, unless you go for a repeat next year maybe?

Our greatest traveller, John Coppenhall matched Henry's record of last year in competing at 23 events. (This figure includes both Championship events.) Will anyone ever beat this record? Also, Sue Coppenhall was at most of these events but I cannot be sure on the number. Closely behind (but using the same transport facilities) was son Ian who entered 21 meetings. Even with Henry's hectic year he still managed 20 events. Liz and I made it to 16, Brian Herring and Ros Stevenson to 12, Derek Coleman and Paul Hinde to 11, Chris Robinson and Brian Welham to 10 and Mark Coppenhall, Peter Hayes and newcomer Alan Bennett to 9.

Even with the slow start to the season due to the Foot & Mouth outbreak, attendances were maintained similar to last year, averaging 16.3 boats per event. The largest gatherings were at the Association Championships at Littleton (42) and the National Championships at Weymouth & Portland (40). At the Open meetings the best turnouts were at Fishers Green (23), Chipstead (22) and Crawley Mariners & Redditch (21).

Our National Champion was John Challener (Mudeford) yet again, who kept his hands firmly on the trophy at a very enjoyable event held with the Duos, Trios & Zeros at Weymouth & Portland. John did have to put up a fight to stave off the strong challenge of Ian. This was Ian's only defeat of the year as earlier in the season he had won the Association Championship at Littleton.

Eastern Aphelion

Meetings in the area were held at Fishers Green, Crawley Mariners, Chipstead, and Hampton Pier. Ian started his domination early in the season with successive victories at Fishers Green, Crawley Mariners and Chipstead to give him the Eastern Aphelion. Mark Wilkins won the Hampton Pier event to add to his 2nd at Crawley Mariners and 3rd from Chipstead to give him the runners-up spot. John Coppenhall had a 3rd at Fishers Green and also took 3rd place in the area that had 7 qualifiers.

Western Aphelion

Merthyr Tydfil SC was again the venue for the final event of the Western Area Aphelion that due to the Foot & Mouth outbreak had 4 of the 5 events in September. Additionally, Mudeford could count either as a South or West. The other meetings were at Redditch, Sutton Bingham, Pingewood and Shearwater. Ian gave the rest of us a chance here. He won at Redditch but only after Debbie Degge had pushed him all the way. Richard Smallwood took the honours at Mudeford. Paul Govier then won at Sutton Bingham with Henry 2nd before Ian popped up again to take Pingewood with brother Mark in 2nd spot. Henry came up trumps in the light airs at Shearwater closely pursued by John Regnard. The final event at Merthyr produced a very exciting day's racing in a good blow where 6 of the fleet of 10 went out reefed. The capsizes were a spectators' dream. It made no difference to Ian, he just showed us that he can master all conditions thrown at him. He won the event and the area whilst Paul Govier achieved 2nd place in both and Henry was 3rd in the area that produced 7 qualifiers.

Central Aphelion

Ian once again was a dominant force with 5 straight wins at Middle Nene, Naseby, Cransley, Banbury and Severn. Naturally, he won this area with brother Mark taking the overall runner up spot aided by a couple of 2nd places at Cransley and Banbury. Alan Bennett took 3rd place in the area helped by a 2nd at Naseby and 3rd at Banbury. Peter Mountford won the meeting at Staunton Harold with Peter Hayes taking 2nd place. Henry chipped in with a 2nd at Middle Nene in an area that produced 12 qualifiers.

Northern Aphelion

This was the best-supported area and produced 16 qualifiers for the area. Well done the North! Perhaps there will be a National Champion from up this way soon. Like last year, the Northern Area Aphelion was sealed up after the first three meetings where Ian won at Winsford Flash, Combs and Carsington. He followed these up with wins at Chester and Redesmere. Last year's area winner, Henry, could only manage silver but was still up there by taking a couple of 2nd places at Winsford Flash and Combs. I had my best result of the year with a 2nd at Redesmere and two 3rd places at Staunton Harold and Winsford Flash to take the bronze. Alan Bennett showed some consistent form to take 4th overall with a 2nd and 3rd at Chester and Redesmere respectively.

Southern Aphelion

Just like in the Northern Aphelion, last year's area winner, Brian Welham had to be content with the runner up spot as Ian took the honours with 3 wins at Taplow Lake, Frensham Pond and Kingsmead. Mark Coppenhall took the honours at Aylesbury with a convincing display closely followed by Robin Ballam who had his best result of the year only a couple of months after a serious illness. There's plenty more years left in you yet Robin it's a good job you can still drive the boat, if not the car! Alan Bennett pushed Ian hard at Kingsmead but had to be content with 2nd. Brian Welham, Len Dean and Simon Thompson also scored 2nd places at Mudeford, Frensham Pond and Fishers Green. Henry crept in with a third at Kingsmead to also take 3rd in the Southern Area where there were 11 qualifiers.

Orbital Trophy

There were 20 helms that qualified for the Orbital award. Ian had sewn up the Orbital Trophy with only a few races gone. The rest of us did have some good battles to try and achieve one of those places that nobody remembers. Henry knew that his crown was gone early on but managed to take the runner up spot. Mark Coppenhall did exceptionally well to take 3rd place considering he only competed at 9 events, half the number that Ian and Henry were at. Likewise, Alan Bennett competed at the same number and was only just behind Mark. Well done Alan, welcome to the wonderful world of Comets, I'll tip you for something better next year considering the fight you gave Ian at Kingsmead. I was 5th with Brian Welham 6th and John Coppenhall in 7th. Simon Thompson had some great results but only just managed to qualify in 8th closely followed by Peter Hayes and Richard Smallwood.

The Ancient Mariners (Senior Citizens) were then grouped together with Derek Coleman getting the better of Brian Herring and Robin Ballam to fill 11th, 12th and 13th spots. A slightly younger gentleman (but only just) showed that a new boat can do well after his performance at the Association Championships in the form of Tony Best came 14th with Chris Robinson not quite achieving his

potential in 15th place. Paul Hinde took 16th slot with our only 2 lady qualifiers, Emma Coppenhall and Ros Stevenson in 17th and 18th. Tom Raine from Rudyard Lake was our youngest qualifier in 19th with Phil Walter just qualifying in 20th.

A Special Award was made at Kingsmead to Sue Coppenhall for all her achievements over this last year in getting the 4 sailing Coppenhalls to the correct destinations. That was some achievement considering that they represented 14% of the total entries throughout the year, yes, that is 1 in 7 boats on the water had a Coppenhall in it!

As most of you will already know, this is my last annual results summary as Liz & I are taking a breather from Committee duties. We will still be there on the circuit, but I urge you all to give our successors your wholehearted support. Ros Stevenson will be taking over the trophy & prize purchasing, whilst Paul Hinde will be co-ordinating the results etc. At least Ros will have an easy job of collecting in the trophies next year as they are mostly at the same household!

NOTES FROM THE COMMITTEE

- 1. The Secretary may only be "at home" at weekends (she's still working in Basingstoke), but the 'phone is manned, by Henry or the answerphone. And, of course, you can send an e-mail.
- 2. The calendar for 2002 is taking shape, with most of the tried and tested venues on the agenda. Redoubt plans to hold an event again, and there have been enquiries from some new clubs hoping to hold their first Comet event.
- 3. The National Championships 2002 will be at Winsford Flash on 24^{th} , 25^{th} and 26^{th} August 2002. Ros Stevenson will be giving more information on the facilities nearer the time.
- 4. The Association Championships will be at Hampton Pier on 25th and 26th May 2002, when we will be joining the Duos.
- 5. Following the Nationals at Weymouth and Portland Sailing Academy, we have presented a set of framed photographs of the event to the Academy, as a memento of the occasion and to record our thanks, along with those of the other Comet fleets.
- 6. The other Comet fleets are having their National events at Rutland Water in mid July, over 2 days. Although we were invited to join them, the date was near the Nationals, and would have meant that helms would have had to take a day off work in order to compete on all three days. Please let the Secretary have any comments and thoughts over the planning of future national events.
- 7. On an associated subject, over the past few years, we have planned our Nationals with 2 races on Day 1, 3 on Day 2, and 2 on Day 3, with 5 races to count. This has enabled people to compete on 2 days if they cannot afford the time to be there for all 3 days. For the Association Championship we have also tended to have 2 discards if there are 5 races (for tidal venues it may be practical to have only 4 races, with 1 discard). Your committee would be grateful for your comments on these arrangements, as we are aware that there has been some criticism of the generosity in respect of the discards.
- 8. Once again, a reminder that your subscription is now due and that the renewal slip is in TIIIS COPY OF PERIHELION!

- 9. The Committee's thanks go to Liz and Phillip Hossell for their generous gift of a new perpetual trophy to be awarded annually. Sue Coppenhall epitomises the spirit of the new award by her unfailing and unflagging support of the Class Association in ensuring that the Coppenhall Fleet is able to participate in so many events. Congratulations Sue.

The Zeros second season hasn't been quite so good as the first but we have three of them ready for customers in the Spring. The Trio has been similar to last year but would have been a lot worse if we didn't get the order for 6 from Ogston S.C. near Chesterfield for club training. The Duo has been very quiet but some have moved second hand creating a bit of interest in the class.

Sales of Comets were also well down but as usual there were plenty of new faces buying used ones, some appeared near the front at Opens and Nationals.

Talking of Nationals, I'm obviously pleased it went so well and I think everyone who went thoroughly enjoyed it. I think some Comet sailors did a double take at me in a Zero on the long beat to the start on the Monday. They are quite nippy little boats and I think I surprised some Comets.


At Weymouth, some of you may have seen a prototype of a new dinghy that's being launched at London Boat Show in January and called, wait for it, Comet Race. The dinghy is 14' non-trapeze 2-person racer with an asymmetric spinnaker on a swivelling pole. In the market place, it could fit in between the RS200 and 400, without requiring vast amounts of skill and agility. Designed by Phil Morrison and initial races suggest a PY of 1050 or less. Unlike the other Comets, there will be no huge list of options, so production and stocking of them should be quite straightforward. This new dinghy will also be at Sailboat.

We have recently started using a local advertising/design company, so next year there will be a more dynamic look and feel to adverts and brochures, thus increasing enquiries and sales. That's the theory anyway! We've recently had the website revamped and by the time you read this, it should have details and pictures of the new dinghy. Our new web site address is:



The inaugural Comet open meeting at Severn Sailing Club was held on the 8th September and supported by seventeen boats that enjoyed a strengthening breeze throughout the day. The fleet was split into two flights to avoid start line chaos with finishing times recorded to produce one set of results.

The first race saw the first flight led away by Phil Hossell from Steve Lemmon and the second flight by Henry Jaggers and John Coppenhall,.

In the first flight the lead was taken by Steve who was eventually overhauled by a charging Ian Coppenhall who went on to win by a large margin from Steve and Phil. Henry led the second flight home with Roger Lemmon and John in pursuit.


By the third race only 9 boats were launched but there was close sailing at the start of the race. Peter Hayes won it, with Peter Mountford taking a very consistent second.

Sunshine and a variable NW wind greeted the 11 contestants at this tree-surrounded gravel quarry venue near Reading, Berks.

For Race One the OOD set a figure-of-eight course around the islands with tricky wind conditions. Ian Coppenhall took an early lead closely followed by brother Mark. Throughout the 6 laps these two steadily increased their lead, to finish 1st and 2nd, despite the leader capsizing on lap 4. They were followed by most of the rest of the fleet in a fairly tight pack, and a small group of tail-enders, some of whom had capsized in the tricky windshifts and gusts. Paul Hinde had an argument with the trees on the last leg of lap 3 and retired. Mark Govier treated the spectators to a particularly drawn-out pirouetting capsize at the start of lap 4. One of the rescue boats was kept busy repositioning a drifting mark during this race.

After lunch Race Two was run on a similar course but with the previously drifting mark deleted. This course caused some difference in opinion as to the best course past the islands, resulting in the pack dividing into two groups on the second leg. The breeze was strong at the start but fell off during lap one, to return later. Ian again took the lead at the start and maintained this throughout, despite a heavy capsize on lap 5 when he fell down the bow of his boat. This caused an injury that prevented him sailing in Race 3. Tony Best fell out of his boat while starting the third lap. Attempted recovery resulted in multiple capsizes, rescue and retirement. Henry Jaggers held second place for most of the race, to the finish, after successfully close covering Mark Coppenhall.

The course was further simplified for Race Three, being 8 laps of a triangle that still required a decision about the best course past the islands. The start was accompanied by a strong breeze, under a dark cloud that threatened rain. John Coppenhall took the lead, with the rest of the fleet in a tight pack. He temporarily lost the lead to Mark Coppenhall on Lap 4, but pulled away again, chased by Mark and Brian Welham with the rest of the fleet now spread over half a lap. Brian finally took the lead on Lap 7 and held it to the finish.



The Club suffered a blow to it's existence earlier this year and the purpose of this report is to let people know that we have survived - so far, and that we intend to continue during 2002.

Back at the end of February we were advised by our landlord, Nickolls Quarries Ltd. that they would not be renewing the agreements with any of the water users clubs after 31st March 2001. The lake was shared with the Cinque Ports Angling Society and the Redoubt Windsurfers Association.

Initially it was not clear if the club would need to close altogether or a different agreement was possible, however it emerged that any user of the water; anglers, sailors or windsurfers would be required to pay fees direct to the landlord. Previously each club paid and annual fee on behalf of all members. The new fees would be £100 for individuals and £130 for family memberships. Previous club membership charges had been around £50. The landlord also took over possession of the club building as he was legally entitled to do under the previous usage agreement. In return water users would have improved access road, parking and clubhouse facilities. In addition more water would be made available for sailing.

While the new charges don't seem excessively high compared to some other clubs, it has to be realised that, as Comet visitors saw at the open meeting in July 2000, facilities are very limited. Nevertheless, as a consequence the Redoubt club membership fell from over 100 to 45 as a direct result of increased charges. Sea Cadets and Sea Scouts who also use the water were also subject to increased charges although some negotiation has been possible to make charges more reasonable. The angling society and windsurf club quit the water altogether.


Sailing has continued through the year with normal spring and summer series continuing with reduced entries. This has meant that we have had to pull all boats into a general handicap rather than have fast and slow handicap races. Only one open meeting for the Solo class was held this year.

Needless to say very few of the promised improved facilities have appeared. We have access to additional water but it is only usable when the water level on the lake is high in Spring, it needs to be dredged and the landlord will not meet the costs.

Our Comet fleet has reduced by two, John Peach and Dave Pescod have moved on to Lasers. On the plus side Bob Luckhurst is about to purchase Comet 697 and there are now two Comet Duos owned by members of the club. In addition we are planning to invite Streakers and Comets to a combined open meeting on 20th July 2002.

Overall we are still fighting to survive and the battle is not yet over, sailing is continuing and we plan to have a progressively more successful 2001, so Cornet Sailors, please support our Open meeting on 20th July.

COMETS, COMETS

Maybe you've guessed it - - - the photo on page 27 is another Comet. This one really is a Comet dinghy! It's not likely to be confused with ours though because as you see it is a double hander. It has been in existence since 1933, manufactured in America. I came across it about 8 years ago in a book published in 1965 (reference below). It seems that it is a 16 ft long hard chine sloop, without spinnaker and was generally "one-design" but has had some freedom at least in the design of the rig. One version had a 22 ft mast with 130 sq ft of sail area. These dimensions make it similar to the Wayfarer without its spinnaker up but clearly there is decking both forrard and aft, like the Graduate. Unlike our logo, theirs looks more like a shooting star than a comet. The sail numbers are likely to be serial, so the 1933 Comet was pretty popular, rivalling many successful British designs. In this photograph the crew are sitting sedately inboard but there is another photograph in the same book showing both crew fully extended, well outside the boat.
